Mr. Clifford Freund, a representative of Lexow & Jenkins, attorneys, appeared before the Board in regard to a resolution employing Lexow & Jenkins as counsel in the action brought against Stephen Flamik, Walter Liebert and Lawrence Sormani by Vincent Kischel. He advised the board that it would be necessary to have two separate resolutions, inasmuch as the police department and justice department are separate from each other.

On motion of Councilman Charles Eberling, seconded by Councilman B. Otto Jacobsen, it was
