

TOWN BOARD MEETING

April 10th, 1942

Mr. Blauvelt called the meeting to order.

Mr. William Blanch, Welfare Officer, appeared before the Board and advised that the State has told him he must cut his force. It is expected that one clerk and one investigator will go. He asked that an extension be granted so that Mrs. Beatrice Hujus, Clerk in his office, will be retained until May 15th, 1942 or longer if the Board sees fit to do so. He also told the Board that if he is required to let an investigator go, that he would recommend that the remaining investigator's salary be increased \$200.00 because of the enlarged territory and case load. He told the Board that Mrs. Stedge, Health Nurse for the town, is being taken over by the County. He said he estimated that there would be a saving of approximately \$1500. by reason of these changes in his office.

Mr. Dickenman moved that Mrs. Beatrice Hujus be retained as a Clerk in the Welfare Office for thirty days until May 15th, 1942 at her regular salary.

Mr. B. Otto Jacobsen appeared before the Board relative to the West Nyack Lighting District. He told the Board that at a meeting with the West Nyack people he had promised to come over and try to straighten out the matter.

Mr. Blauvelt told Mr. Jacobsen that the Board had had several meetings with the West Nyack people, that the Board wasn't trying to sell them the district, but just trying to see if they wouldn't consider having smaller lights.

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Mr. Jacobsen told the Board that upon his return from Florida, he had telephoned Mr. Brandenburg, and that he and several people came to Mr. Jacobsen's home. He further added that the idea was not originated by the Board but by taxpayers who sent in the petition, which the Board acted on. He pointed out that there was a question of the lights being fancy. This was worked out by the General Electric people, who recommended these lights for the district through their representative and not the Rockland Light & Power Company. Fourteen lights he added were recommended in the first place, but it was cut down to eight lights, so that they would get more light. He said that he didn't recommend that the lights come out in case of an accident. Mr. Jacobsen said he thought the railroad could be included and smaller lights put in some place, and the district extended. He pointed out that prior to the lights, there was quite a lot of stealing of automobile tires, which has been eliminated since the lights are in. He said that if you take out one of the big lights, you would have to have two or three small lights to make up for the large lights. The rate is 400 candlepower, which is not bad for that light. He said he understood that there was some discussion about the taxpayers paying for service to commuters. He pointed out that the commuters take the attitude that they were in New York, and when they came out here to live they spend their money here. He told the Board that the people who benefit the most from the commuters are the ones who are complaining. Mr. Jacobsen said he wanted to take all responsibility for the district, as he told the people the rate would be 24¢ and even 22¢. It was all done in good faith. There was no wrong intention on the part of the Board, and he said he wanted to take all responsibility. He said it was an honest mistake, and that the Board would not have passed this district if they knew the tax would be so high. He told the Board he felt it would be a tragedy to remove the lights, and said he didn't want the responsibility on his shoulders. Mr. Jacobsen said he was "between the devil and the deep blue sea" over the lights. He told the Board that Mr. Brandenburg wants to remove the lights entirely. Agrees the lights are a burden, but doesn't feel that it will correct the wrong to remove the lights. He said the lights were put in for the protection and safety of the public, and that the amount of express money and mail coming into the district needs good lights.

Mr. Blauvelt told Mr. Jacobsen that in the various meetings, Mr. Brandenburg was the spokesman and wanted the lights removed.

Mr. Jacobsen said that at the meeting held in his home, Mr. Brandenburg

had made up his mind that the lights should be removed. He said he would rather talk to others, such as Harry Schek. He said he understood that Mr. Brandenburg was not a taxpayer, that the property was in his wife's name.

Mr. Goebel suggested that the district be increased, and the valuation also increased, so that the rate can be reduced.

Mr. Jacobsen told the Board he felt the district was a very good one, but unfortunately the assessment in the district was too low. He said he wished to ^{do} everything possible to help, but had no solution to offer, and felt this would probably be up to the Supervisor.

Emil Klein told the Board that there was a petition out to abolish the district, and that he had signed it. The people want the district abolished because it was impossible to get the guarantee of the Town Board that the rate would be 32¢.

Mr. Blauvelt said that it was impossible to guarantee a rate in a district, as the valuation might change.

Dr. Gilchrest moved that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with.

Mr. Blauvelt said that he had received a bill from the Village of Nyack Water Commissioners with a war expense surcharge of 10% of the amount of the bill which is \$13.50. This covers for a 3-month period, the total amount being \$135.00.

The Board decided to hold the matter over until the May 15th meeting and refer it to our Town attorney for further investigation.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from Geo. M. Edsall regarding the termination of liability on the bond of Elsie Haerle, Deputy Receiver of Taxes.

Mr. Goebel moved that liability on Bond #SB-634897 covering C. Elsie Haerle, Deputy Receiver of Taxes, be terminated as of December 31, 1941, as a new bond #1S56681 has been written effective January 1st, 1942.

Mr. Blauvelt read a telegram from Garrett Miller, Fort Lauderdale, Florida, in which he advised the Town Board that the West Nyack Swamp would have his immediate attention.

Chief Liebert reported that nothing had been done at the West Nyack Dump, and that the Water had not been turned on.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from Garrett Miller, Jr. advising that the dump would be covered by dirt and the water hydrant turned on before April 13th, 1942.

Mr. Brandenburg appeared before the Board and asked what explanation

Mr. Jacobsen had given, as he had promised to appear before the Board and answer the question about the 24¢ rate. Mr. Brandenburg further indicated that Mr. Jacobsen was unwilling to give any information on this when the meeting was held at his home.

Mr. Blauvelt told him that he had not said anything about the 24¢ rate.

Mr. Brandenburg then wanted to know what he did say, and asked for the minutes.

Mr. Blauvelt told Mr. Brandenburg that it would be difficult to give him the minutes just at the moment, as the notes would have to be transcribed, but added that Mr. Jacobsen had told the Board he took all responsibility for giving out the 24¢ rate, and that it was an honest mistake.

Mr. Eberling then asked Mr. Brandenburg if he would be interested in seeing the figures on smaller lights in the district, and Mr. Brandenburg replied that he was not personally interested in the figures.

Mrs. Bonsall appeared and asked why the lights had not been carried out as outlined in the petition. She told the Board that she understood from Mr. Jacobsen that Charles Haerle had requested that a light be omitted, and because of that request it was omitted. She said that according to Mr. Jacobsen Mr. Haerle appeared before the Board, and that it was on the minutes of the Town Board meetings. She said that it wasn't fair that a person in politics should have such a request granted, which would throw more burden on the rest of the taxpayers. Mrs. Bonsall said that she didn't sign the petition, as she didn't want the light, and it wasn't ever put there.

Mr. Blauvelt told Mrs. Bonsall that Mr. Haerle never appeared before this Board and asked that the light be omitted.

Mr. Wexler said that he didn't know who set up the district at the particular time. The usual practice is for members of the Board to confer with the Board of Assessors, or have the attorney confer with the Board of Assessors to determine the natural district. He said he could see how the burden would be heavy with such a small district, but that it would not be so bad with smaller lights.

Mrs. Bonsall told the Board that she understood that Mr. Jacobsen selected the lights and not the Rockland Light.

Mr. Wexler said that he understood from Mr. Schriver, a representative of the Rockland Light, that in almost every instance the small lights are satisfactory.

Mrs. Bonsall said she understood that the Rockland Light does not bill in advance.

Mr. Wexler told her that the previous Board of Assessors did not put the district on the books in time to assess in the 1940 tax roll, and that it is really an accumulation of a bill.

Mrs. Bonsall said she understood that the rate would be 80¢ per hundred per year.

Mr. Wexler said that this was true, but that the rate of \$2.25 was really an accumulation of services rendered by the Rockland Light plus large bulbs. Small lights would cost about \$23.00, whereas the large bulbs cost \$59.00.

Mrs. Bonsall then told the Board that she understood from Mr. Jacobsen that the error was made by someone who is trying to shield himself or herself. It is my understanding that someone else other than Mr. Jacobsen made the error.

Mr. Wexler then informed the Board that the Rockland Light had not discussed figures before the petition was presented to the Town Board. Mr. Parshall is willing to sit with the Board to work out a solution. However, they have advised that if the district is abolished, they have use for the fixtures. Mr. Wexler added that if the district were larger, the burden would be shared by more people, and this might solve the question of the rate. However, he urged that the people should get together before disposing of the district.

Mr. Brandenburg said that he was very surprised to hear that Mr. Jacobsen had admitted it was his mistake, as he had told the people when they met with him that someone else had made a mistake, and why should he take the rap for it.

Mr. Wexler then reminded the Board that the Rockland Light & Power Company may be required by the public service commission to enforce the 10 year contract. They are bound by the rules of the public service commission. The Town Council may have to charge any damages to this district. This should be carefully looked into before you make your decision.

Mr. Brandenburg said that if it is necessary to go before the public service commission they would do so and explain the whole set up. He said they were misinformed by a man of the Town Council, and that he does not believe anyone will hold the taxpayers for a contract signed by the Board under these circumstances.

Mr. Blauvelt then said that the Board wants to do everything possible to help the people out of this predicament.

Mr. Klein then asked if the Town Board ever received any figures from the Rockland Light before the district was established, as there are rumors around West Nyack that the Town Board is responsible.

Mr. Blauvelt said that he had no correspondence with the Rockland Light, but that they had secured copies of the correspondence with Mr. Jacobsen, and there was no mention of any 2 1/2% rate.

Mr. Brandenburg said he understood that the Rockland Light had not given any figures to anyone on this district. The drawing up of the assessment is not their business.

Mr. Goebel then said he understood from Mr. Jacobsen that the General Electric people had recommended the lights for the district.

Mr. Blauvelt told Mr. Brandenburg that if they were quoted a rate when the people were asked to sign the petition, the Board knew nothing about it. They knew nothing about the district until the petition was presented to them.

Mr. Eberling said that when a person goes around with a petition, the Board doesn't know about it. They can't quote a price on a district until all the particulars are known.

Dr. Gilchrest then said that when the petition was brought in the Board were told that was what the people wanted.

Mr. Brandenburg then added that Mr. Jacobsen had said Mr. Eberling knew about the rate.

Mr. Eberling told Mr. Brandenburg that he did not know about the rate.

Mr. Wexler said he believed it would be a good idea to have a meeting of the residents of the district and have the Tax Collector present, so that the people can tell what they really want. He said he felt that any action taken at this time may be a little hasty and may be regretted a year

from now.

Mr. Blauvelt said that the Board wanted to straighten this out, but they didn't want the people to abolish the district and be sorry later.

Mr. Brandenburg told the Board he felt the people could do very well without the lights, and that they are fed up with the district. He then presented a petition signed by taxpayers within the district to disestablish the West Nyack Lighting Dist. He told the Board the people would like them to act on the petition immediately.

Mr. Brandenburg then said he felt that someone was passing the buck, and that the people didn't intend to be bound by a contract at the present rate, although they didn't object to a rate of 24¢.

Mr. Blauvelt told him that no one has been passing the buck, and that the Board will do all they can to straighten this matter out.

Mr. Phillips said that when the petition was brought to him, nothing was said about a 10 year contract and asked if that is a legal thing. He added that he didn't want a law suit on his hands.

Mr. Blauvelt advised him that for a lighting district, the contract is for a 10 year period.

Mr. Henry Steinmann appeared and advised the Board that the American Legion had held a meeting and that he appeared as a spokesman for them to request that Mrs. Beatrice Hujus be given some consideration in her position as a Clerk in the Welfare Office. He said they realized the department naturally would have to be cut due to the welfare cases, but asked that she be retained for a short time so that they can find another position for her. He informed them that any consideration shown would be appreciated.

Mr. Blauvelt advised the Board that Mr. Carey, Building Inspector, had asked him if he might have a smaller amended zoning map made. Mr. Blauvelt said he would be glad to take this up with the Planning Board.

Mr. Blauvelt announced that Mrs. Stedge, Health Nurse for the Town, would be transferred to County Nurses Service as of April 16th.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from the Moleston Fire Commissioners, advising that certain members had been expelled from the fire company.

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Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from Mrs. Hazel Buhler, Secretary of the West Nyack P.T.A. requesting that a policeman be stationed at the Jones Four-Corners in West Nyack between the hours of 8:30 and 9:00 A.M. and 3:00 and 3:30 P.M. when the children are coming from and going to school.

Dr. Gilchrest moved that the letter be referred to the Chief of Police, and request him to do whatever he believes is adviseable.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from the New City Park Club, Inc. requesting that roads in New City Park be taken over and maintained by the Town of Clarkstown.

Mr. Klein suggested that the Town Clerk write a letter to the New City Park Club, Inc. and send them a copy of the regular resolution on the minutes regarding the qualifications necessary before roads can be taken over by the Town.

Dr. Gilchrest moved that the Town Clerk write a letter to the New City Park Club, Inc. and send them a copy of the resolution regarding roads to be accepted by the Town.

Mr. Blauvelt presented a bill from the New York Telephone Co. amounting to \$8.65 covering service and extension of a telephone in the office of Mr. Haerle, Receiver of Taxes. Mr. Blauvelt told the Board that because of the extension, which Mr. Haerle did not order, he would not approve the bill.

The bill was then presented for audit by the Board.

Mr. Blauvelt then presented two bills of the Rockland Light & Power Company - one for \$16.92 covering an extension of street lighting in Congers and the other for \$77.00 covering street lights on Nyack Turnpike.

The bills were presented for audit by the Town Board.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from T. F. Redmond, Democratic County Chairman, recommending Democratic Inspectors of Election for the Town of Clarkstown.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from Florence Jensen, Chairman of Clarkstown Republican Committee, recommending Republican Inspectors of Election for the Town of Clarkstown.

The matter of a lease for the police department headquarters was discussed by the Town Board, and the lease was referred to Mr. Wexler, Attorney, to be checked.

After looking over the lease, Mr. Wexler said he found it satisfactory, but urged the addition of the following clause.

"It is further covenanted and agreed that the party of the second part may use the premises herein in such manner and keep and maintain such supplies and materials as are ordinarily needed to expedite the usual business of the police force of the Town of Clarkstown."

Mr. Eberling moved that the lease with the Nanuet National Bank covering a building occupied by the police department for a term of three years beginning April 1, 1942 and ending March 31st, 1945 at a rental of \$30.00 per month in advance or \$360.00 per year, be approved and accepted with the insertion of a clause recommended by Mr. Wexler, Town Attorney, and that the Supervisor be authorized to sign the lease.

Chief Liebert suggested that the Board take into consideration the fact that it is impossible to hold jury trials in the Town Clerk's office, and the Justices have a right to select the place where they will hold court.

Mr. Dickenman moved that Mr. Blauvelt be given authority to rent the office upstairs at a rental of \$30.00 per month, effective May 1, 1942.
