

TOWN BOARD MEETING

Oct. 8, 1943

Town Clerk's Office

2:00 P.M.

Present: Mr. Schmersahl

Mr. Blauvelt called the meeting to order and requested the reading of the minutes for the last regular meeting.

Mrs. Buchenau then read the minutes of the meeting held September 10th, 1943.

Mr. Dickenman said he would like to have that portion of the minutes corrected which refers to Smith St. in Rockland Lake by the insertion of the following words:

"by residents of Smith St."

Mr. Blauvelt then told the Board that in order to comply with Civil Service regulations, it would be necessary to have the resolution corrected appointing Mr. Ryckman to calculate the tax roll. The correction should read -

"Bookkeeper to the Supervisor".

Mr. Dickenman then moved the minutes be adopted as read with the aforementioned corrections.

Seconded by Dr. Goebel

Mr. Blauvelt reported to the Board that the matter of holding an examination for Welfare Officer has been taken care of, and that the date of the examination will soon be set by the Civil Service authorities.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from Lawrence Sorman, thanking the Board for their letter of sympathy in his recent bereavement.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from Mr. Fajen in which he advised that beginning January 1st, 1944, he is asking \$50.00 per month rent for the Town Clerk's office.

After discussing the matter, the Board decided to refer the question of higher rent to the Town Attorney, with the request that he

report back at the next meeting.

Mr. Blauvelt then read a letter from Edward Makowski in which he requests the Board to extend Freemont Ave. in Nanuet a distance of 75 feet.

Inasmuch as Mr. Klein, Supt. of Highways, was not present when the letter was read, the Board decided to hold the matter up until they could confer with him regarding it.

Mr. Harrison, Veterans Welfare Officer, appeared before the Board relative to a recent editorial in the Journal-News. He told the Board that he felt the information in the editorial was not accurate and therefore not fair. He further added that he believed such information should come from his office rather than from the County Commissioner's office. He told the Board that his salary is approximately \$12.00 per week. Mr. Harrison said that there are nine veterans cases for which he has been able to get state and federal relief. He informed the Board that when a person comes to him, he goes over the case very carefully and tries to get all the assistance he can for his client. There are various pension which are available to veterans, and if they have any children in service, allowances can be secured from the government. If necessary, hospitalization is secured for them. If the client is able to work, every effort is made through employment services to get them gainfully employed. Mr. Harrison told the Board that he has always made a great effort to practice economy, and whenever it is necessary, he issues a credit voucher through local merchants, as this is generally preferred rather than a food order. He further pointed out that there is the Army and Navy Emergency Relief which many times saves the Board from spending town funds.

Mr. Blauvelt told Mr. Harrison that he believed the Board had commended him previously for the fine work he has done.

Dr. Goebel said he felt that Mr. Harrison should be complimented for his efforts in trying to rehabilitate people needing relief. He said that anyone who has done this deserves a medal.

Dr. Goebel moved that Mr. Harrison, Veterans Welfare Officer, be complimented for the work he has done and the money he has saved the people of Clarkstown.

Seconded by Mr. Dickenman

Mr. Wexler in commenting on this matter, said he understood that

the Board appoints the Veterans Welfare Officer, but that they do not appropriate any funds.

Mr. Harrison said that the Board appropriates an amount for the use of the Veterans Welfare Officer. The Board appoints the Veterans Welfare Officer on the recommendation of the Veterans organization.

Mr. Handley, Welfare Officer, appeared before the Board and said he wanted to report relative to a welfare case he brought before the Board about two months ago. The family is now off relief for the first time in ten years. It is estimated that this particular case has cost the Town about \$6500. during the past ten years. He said that he wanted no credit for accomplishing this, as he was only happy to do his job. He said, however that he could not have accomplished what he did without the cooperation of the Board and the law.

Mr. Handley reported further that the mortgage papers have been drawn on the other case he brought before the Board, and that it is expected within a short time that the Town will be reimbursed for all the assistance given.

Mr. Klein, Supt. of Highways, reported that he was scarifying and putting down a new road on Break Neck Hill, pursuant to the request of Mrs. Palen.

Mr. Klein reported that the road up to Mr. Mokowski's house was a town road, but not beyond. He said he would investigate further and report back to the Board at the next Town Board meeting.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from F. Malcolm Hague, Leland P. Stone and W. Reginald Herdman, enclosing petitions for a proposed water district in Congers as a postwar project.

The Board then discussed the matter at length. Mr. Dickenman pointed out that at least 50% of the people in the district must sign the petition and that if the district is not able to stand the expenses of the water system, the town would be burdened with the district. He also pointed out to the Board that there is always the possibility many people who sign for the district will not take the water after the district is created.

Dr. Goebel then requested the assessed valuation of the Congers Fire District since the proposed water district is to be comparable to

said fire district.

Mr. Blauvelt then gave to Dr. Goebel the figures he requested.

Mr. Blauvelt appointed Mr. Dickenman and Dr. Goebel as a committee to consult with the people of Congers regarding the proposed water district and to advise them of the results of forming such a district.

Mr. Blauvelt presented bills received from Congers and Central Nyack Defense Centers covering light, telephone and heat. Mr. Blauvelt said that there is not sufficient funds left in these accounts to pay the bills, and that the only thing the Board can do is return them to the Co-Ordinators. Mr. Blauvelt pointed out that \$1000. has been put in the budget for next year covering civilian defense expenses.

Mr. Blauvelt then presented the following reports:

Trial Balance of Supervisor, showing the balance of the Town as of Sept. 30, 1943 in the amount of \$104,508.41.

Supervisor's Report for September, showing total receipts in the amount of \$11,052.48, and disbursements in the amount of \$8,861.92.

Town Clerk's Report for September, showing total receipts amounting to \$250.75. The amount remitted to the Supervisor was \$26.95.

The reports of Frederick R. Engels, Justice of the Peace, covering the month of August, 1943 in the amount of \$19.50 and September, 1943 in the amount of \$70.00.

The reports of Irvin F. Dillon, Justice of the Peace, covering the month of August, 1943 in the amount of \$141.50 and September, 1943 in the amount of \$103.50.

The Building Inspector's report showing total receipts for September, 1943 in the amount of \$38.00.

The Welfare Officer's Report for September, showing total expenditures of \$703.89. The total case load was 21, and 52 individuals shared in the relief.

Dr. Goebel moved the reports of the various town officers be approved and accepted.

Seconded by Mr. Dickenman

Mr. Blauvelt told the Board that he felt something should be written to Sergeant Wiebicke on the death of his brother, who was killed in a recent aeroplane crash while serving his country.

Dr. Gilchrest moved that a letter of condolence be written to Sergeant Wiebicke, expressing the sympathy of the Board in his recent loss, the death of his brother.

After discussing matters pertaining to health in Board of Health Meeting, on motion of Mr. Dickenman seconded by Dr. Gilchrest the Board reconvened into regular town board meeting.

Mr. Blauvelt read a letter from the Postwar Public Works Planning Commission, enclosing four copies of the contract form and two copies of the certification form for the proposed Town Hall. Mr. Blauvelt said that the Board has ninety days in which to sign the papers.

It was decided to hold the matter over until the next meeting.

Dr. Gilchrest told the Board that Mr. Ronan had given permission to plant the small park on Route 59, west of the West Nyack Cloverleaf. Dr. Gilchrest said he believed it could be planted for about \$100.00.

In discussing the matter, the Board was of the opinion that some fill would be required before the Park could be planted. Mr. Klein, Supt. of Highways, said he would be glad to help fill it in, but that the cost would be about \$150.00. Dr. Gilchrest told the Board he felt the cost would be too high, and that he would abandon his idea of beautifying this small place.

Before taking up the question of the 1944 budget, Mr. Dickenman said he would like to say a few words. He pointed out that salary increases are being given in private enterprise in both the higher and

lower brackets on a percentage basis. He said he believed it was his duty as a Councilman to keep the budget as low as possible while still allowing increases where requested. Mr. Blauvelt informed Dr. Gilchrest that an amount had been put in the 1944 budget to cover this item.

The Board then decided to hold the meeting on Nov. 4, 1943 at 7:00 P.M.

The Board then discussed the budget and the matter of salary increases.

Mr. Wexler, Town Attorney, then reported to the Board on various matters, as follows:-

Two writs of Certiorari have been served on the Assessors and the Town Clerk by A. Zukor and wife and the Rockingham Park Corp. This matter has been referred to him, and he is taking whatever steps are necessary.

In the Trap Rock case, the answer has been served on the attorney for the plaintiff.

Relative to zoning, Mr. Wexler said he has been working with Mr. Elliott, Building Inspector, and Mr. Herdman, Chairman of the Board of Appeals, on the matter of pigs. He said that he has prepared a questionnaire on pigs. He pointed out to the Board that in Residence A, B, and C the Ordinance forbids the raising of pigs, etc. for commercial purposes. He said that as far as he knows the Zoning Board of Appeals has not yet used his opinion. He further added that the customary method of getting facts is by a hearing which sometimes is very lengthy. He also told the Board that he has been working with the Board of Appeals on forms and procedure. He said the whole problem of a building code has also come up, and that a building code should be attached to the Ordinance.

Regarding the welfare case he has been working on with Mr. Handley, Mr. Wexler told the Board that the papers - bond and mortgage - have been prepared, and that another relief case has been removed from the rolls, taking a heavy load from the town.

Mr. Schmersahl moved that Mr. Haerle, Receiver of Taxes, collect school and state and county taxes in the different communities in the Town of Clarkstown.
