

PUBLIC HEARING

Mr. Dillon called the hearing to order, explaining that it was being held to consider the application of Jacob Myers to change the zoning of his property in Manuet from Residence B to Business B District.

Miss Martling, Town Clerk, read the notice of the hearing and presented the affidavit of publication.

Mr. Dillon then announced that those wishing to speak in favor of the proposed change would be heard first and those opposed would be heard afterward.

Mr. Stephen Doig appeared as attorney for Mr. Myer and told the Board that the property in question lies east of Manuet on Route 59 and is just west on the north side of Route 59 from the old railroad bed of New York and New Jersey railroad. He said that Mr. Myer owns 50 acres of land there, and has a real stake in the Town of Clarkstown. He is asking to have rezoned 200 feet in depth on Route 59, and the purposes for which the property is to be used is to erect a building in which will be stored and sold new and used building materials. Mr. Doig said that just so he might anticipate opposition, he wished to make it clear that the new and used building materials are not junk. They are materials that are very necessary today in times when materials are so very scarce. Mr. Doig stated that this is an application to rezone the property to business B. In this connection, he pointed out to the Board that the property of St. Anthony's church lies to the west, and that in the rear will be Mr. Myer's property which will be Residence A and which will in future years be developed, as he expects to put in some 5000 feet of roads. Directly across the street there is the property of Mr. Theodore Warner, who runs a garage, and to the east of Mr. Warner is Jerry Hermandeau, who runs a garage and filling station. Slightly to the east is a junk yard. Mr. Doig said that the property in question will not be used for a junk yard, and he then pointed out the fact that the Zoning Ordinance prohibits junk yards in a Business district. He then quoted Section K of the General Provisions of the Zoning Ordinance which definitely prohibits the storage or sale of junk in either a Residence or Business District. Mr. Doig stated that the property would be used for the purposes permitted in the ordinance and for no other purposes.

Mr. Doig pointed out that the amount of property to be rezoned is in very small percentage to the amount of property he owns. The character of the neighborhood, Mr. Doig pointed out, is definitely business, as the property on

Route 59 in that neighborhood is used for business. It will mean an increase in taxes for the Town and will improve the character of the neighborhood which is business.

Mr. Doig then presented signatures of a number of property owners in the vicinity who consent to this change.

Mrs. Theodore Warner then appeared and stated that she and her husband had signed a petition with the idea that it would be changed to Business B. However, since they signed, they were told that it would be used for second hand materials, and that if this is true, they oppose it.

Mr. Donald Partridge then appeared on behalf of property owners in the vicinity of the proposed change. He told the Board that the people are interested in improving the village of Hamlet and don't want to harm it. They already have a junkyard on Route 59, and it has been said that after the first junkyard, you come to the four corners. Mr. Partridge told the Board he hoped that they would not be able to say after the second junkyard, you come to the four corners. He then informed the Board that the understanding is that this application was being made for the purpose of permitting the owner to use the premises for the sale of second hand material. Therefore, when some of the adjoining owners heard of it, they were opposed to it. He said that originally they did not oppose a change to business, but that three days ago someone came forth with the truth of the matter that Mr. Myer has some kind of an arrangement with Camp Shanks whereby he takes the plumbing and other materials and stores them on his premises and then resells them. Mr. Partridge stated that he understands Mr. Myer has a place in Blauvelt, and that this place is as close to a junkyard as anyone would want. He does not have second hand cars, but does have old building materials. He said that several of the owners were approached, and that he has spoken with them, and they are opposed to the change. He gave the names of Mr. Warner, Mr. and Mrs. Bernitter, Mr. Bardon, Mr. Lawrence, and Mrs. Zabel, who are opposed to the change. He then presented a simple petition signed by a number of people in the vicinity, opposing it, and also presented photographs taken of the place in Blauvelt, which Mr. Myer is now operating.

Mr. Doig then spoke again on behalf of his client and told the board that the issues should be confined to Clarkstown and to no other place. He said that his client was not going to run a junkyard, and that he intends to put up a building about 25 feet wide and 125 feet long. The materials will be stored in this building, and that at no time will they be stored outside.

There were no others who wished to speak either for or against the proposed change.

Mr. Eberling then moved that the Board reserve decision until a future date.

Seconded by Mr. Welchman

Carried

Mr. Dillon then told those present that after the Board has reached a decision in the matter all parties will be notified.

Mr. Eberling moved the hearing be closed.

TOWN BOARD MEETING

Mr. Dillon called the meeting to order.

Mr. Eberling moved that the reading of the minutes for the last regular meeting be dispensed with.

Seconded by Mr. Schmersahl

Mr. Roald Hall appeared before the Board representing the Union at Lederle Laboratories, and he spoke on the odor problem. He told the Board that Lederle employs approximately 2400 people, and they are naturally interested in full employment. He pointed out that people have raised objections regarding the odor, and that upon investigation, it was found that Lederle has done a great deal to remedy this condition. On Sept. 21st, Mr. Hall told the Board, Mr. Malcolm, Vice-Pres. & Gen. Manager, drafted a letter to the employees regarding the work Lederle has done, and he furnished copies for the Board members to read. He said that the company is doing everything in their power to alleviate the condition, and that hundreds of dollars has been spent to correct the condition. He then told the board that the beautiful surroundings at Lederle, especially the spacious lawns and beautiful flower beds are indications of the company's community pride regarding its buildings. Mr. Hall told the Board that it has been called to his attention that other products which Lederle intends to produce are to be taken to other plants throughout the country, and he said that it was to be hoped that this was not going to happen at the plant in Pearl River due to the criticism they received because of the odor.

Mrs. Edna Rose, also representing the Union, appeared and told the Board that they are interested in full and gainful employment. She said that if industry is forced out, it will mean a lot to the Town and also the employees, since they have had to pay out of their paychecks towards the cost of alleviating the odor problem. She told the Board that Duomyelin, a new product will not be produced at Lederle, but that it will be taken to the plant at Willow Run. This will mean a loss of money both in taxes for the Town and also employment for Rockland County people.

Mr. Dillon then told both Mr. Hall and Mrs. Rose that he and Mr. Roope, Town Attorney, met with a committee of residents from Nanuet, and that Mr. Roope advised them the Board had no jurisdiction of any odor. This is purely a personal matter between themselves and Lederle.

Mrs. Rose then told the Board that she was told they could turn it over to the Board of Health.

Mr. Dillon then told Mrs. Rose that this Town Board would have no jurisdiction anyway, since Lederle was in the Town of Orangetown. He stated further that it was his understanding that this was settled sometime ago when the State Health Authorities were down here and told them it was not a health menace.

Mr. Victor Smith then appeared, representing a group of people in New City, regarding the restrictions of the Planning Board, whereby the Building Inspector insists in a great many cases that you must show a 50 foot right of way with a 21 foot road bed, consisting of a suitable base bound with screenings and oiled, before he will give you a permit to build if it is 100 or 500 feet off the road. Mr. Smith told the Board that if he wished to go back 1000 feet on his own property, he felt it was none of the Town's business whether he goes in on his property on a dirt road or an esculator. He further added that he did not feel the Town should come into the picture until such time as they are asked to take over and maintain the road as a Town road. Mr. Smith then told the Board he felt the restrictions were strangulation. In other words, if you have a plot of 50 acres, you can't sell a lot unless the Planning Board says you can. He told the Board that he was in accord with the 50 foot right of way and a subbase of stone, but that he felt something should be done about the code if possible.

Mr. Welchman then told Mr. Smith that the Board has met in a joint meeting with the Planning Board to discuss the restrictions, and that they expect to have another meeting to see what can be done to relax some of the requirements. One thing they are considering is the right of way of 50 feet and the relaxing of the surfacing of the road. He said they hope to avoid some of the restrictions.

Mr. Smith then told the Board that neither the Knapp colony, the Goebel colony or Lake Lucille has hurt the town, but rather it has been a real asset.

Mr. Welchman then told Mr. Smith that he understood that no one who has appeared before the Planning Board on sub-division control has been dissatisfied.

Mr. Smith then told the Board that this was not so, and he know it.

Mr. Roald Hall appeared before the Board regarding roads in New City Park. He said that two roads, namely, Park Terrace and Onley Place were left off the list when the State was asked for permission to take over the roads at 40 feet. He said that these two roads are a part of his dad's estate, which they are trying to clear up. He asked the Board to take over and maintain them at 40' as they did the other roads.

Mr. Smith then told the Board that he felt that before the roads are taken over, they should find out if there is a subbase of stone on them.

Mr. Dillon then told Mr. Smith that a resolution was passed a few years back by a previous Town Board that may be binding on the Town, and that the

Board will have the Town Attorney check this resolution.

Mr. Dillon then read a letter from the Central Nyack Welfare Association requesting that the boundary of the voting district be changed, so that residents on the north end of Mountain View Ave. may vote in Central Nyack rather than in Valley Cottage.

The matter was referred to Mr. Roepe, Town Attorney, for his opinion.

Mr. Dillon read another letter from the Central Nyack Welfare Association requesting that warning signs be placed at the bad curves on Mountain View Ave. because of the fact that there has been an increased number of accidents on this road.

When asked to report, Mr. Flein, Supt. of Highways, told the Board that he had put up curve signs on Mountain View Ave. but that on investigation he was unable to find any holes in the road. He also said that he had told the people that he didn't think the Board could put up signs regulating the speed on this road to 20 miles per hour.

The Board requested the Town Clerk to advise the Central Nyack Welfare Association that Mr. Klein has investigated the matter and placed the signs they requested.

Mr. Dillon read a letter from the Zoning Board of appeals, in which they advise that the present operation of the Miller airport in West Nyack is not a violation of the zoning Ordinance.

Mr. Eberling moved that a copy of the letter from the **Zoning Board** regarding the Miller Airport in West Nyack be sent to Mr. Rodwald.

The Board then discussed the matter at length, and Mr. Dillon pointed out to them that there is a great deal of congestion when the people stop for their papers and their mail, especially during commuting hours.
