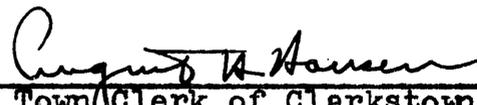
No one appeared before the Board either for or against the adoption of the Assessment Roll.

Mr. Dillon called the hearing to order, explaining that it had been called to consider the application of Harvey Polhemus for a change of zoning of his property at West Nyack from "Res. B" to "Bus. B". Mr. Dillon said that the Board would listen first to those in favor of the change and then to those in opposition.

Mr. Orville Mann came before the Board as Attorney for the Petitioner. Mr. Mann said that Mr. Polhemus was holding the property in trust for himself and three other individuals, of which he was one, and they had also developed the West Nyack Estates, which was west of the railroad in the general area of the property in question. Mr. Mann said that an offer had been received from a commercial firm to purchase the property pending the change of zoning, and he went into detail to describe the surrounding properties, stating that it was bounded on the north by the present business zone, on the west by the Rockland Light & Power High Tension Line and the Railroad, on the south by the Hackensack Swamp and on the east by the swamp and the Hackensack Creek. Mr. Mann said that the property would be used for light metal manufacturing such as Window Sash, etc. He said that it would be a clean, quiet business and would employ about 300 people, most of whom would be residents of the County.

Mr. Harold A. Batzold of West Nyack came before the Board in opposition. He stated that a decision on the application should be deferred until the new zoning ordinance is passed. He stated that he is living at present in West Nyack Estates and he was assured when he bought his home that the area east of the railroad tracks would remain residential.

Mr. Doyle Brannon of West Nyack stated that he was the real estate agent who was handling the transaction. He said that the plant would be manufacturing metal window frames and would employ 300 people from the County. Mr. Brannon said that the location and surroundings of the property did not lend itself to residential development.

Mr. Mann came before the Board again and stated that no one had ever told Mr. Batzold that the property in question would remain residential. He said that it was a separate parcel entirely from the West Nyack Estates and there was no connection between the two.

No one else appeared to speak for or against the application.

Mr. Welchman moved that the Board reserve decision and the hearing be closed.

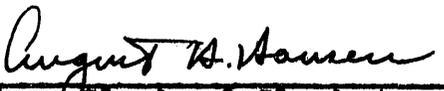

Mr. Dillon called the meeting to order.

Mr. Schmersahl moved that the reading of the minutes of the last regular meeting be dispensed with.

Seconded by Mr. Burleigh.

Carried.

Mr. Stanley Partridge of West Nyack came before the Board in regard to the discontinuance of the Bus Stop at the West Nyack Railroad Station. Mr. Partridge said that the new stop was very impractical since it exposed the children to the hazards of traffic. He said that the children have to walk down to the triangle at Route 59 to get the Bus and they are dropped off in the same place in the afternoon.

Mrs. Wm. Shank of West Nyack came before the Board in opposition to the change in the Bus Stop. Mrs. Shank said that there are about 35 children on the Bus and when they are dropped off they spread out all over the street in an area where traffic is usually quite heavy. She also said that on rainy days the new Bus Stop is flooded and the children have to walk through the water.

Mr. Dillon informed those present that the Bus Company had discontinued the Station stop because the one way street was always blocked by trucks loading at the railroad siding. Mr. Dillon read a letter from the Rockland Transit Corp. suggesting that if a lane were kept clear in the parking lot between Western Highway and the railroad the Buses would be able to maintain a stop at the intersection of old Route 59 and Western Highway which is only a short distance from the railroad station.

Mr. Harlold Batzold of West Nyack, stated that he was opposed to the change in Bus Stops and also to the proposed solution. He said that the Bus Company's solution would reduce the parking area at the station which is hardly sufficient now.

Mr. Lincoln Waldron of West Nyack came before the Board. Mr. Waldron said that if the one way streets used by the Bus were maintained for public traffic, there would be no problem.

Mr. Clinton Partridge of West Nyack said that the Board was negligent on the Bus problem. He said that the condition was very dangerous to the children and should be cleared up immediately. Mr. Partridge suggested that the Board provide police protection for the school bus from St. Anthony's School to the stop at West Nyack.

Mr. Charles Partridge of West Nyack also came before the Board in opposition to the change of Bus Stops.

Mr. Dillon said that the Board would provide police protection for the school bus until such time as a solution could be found.

Michael Franchino came before the Board representing the Garbage Collectors who used the Town Dump. Mr. Franchino said that the opening hours of the Dump were very inconvenient since most of the Collectors started quite early in the morning, and the Dump was not open in time for them to dump their first load. He asked if the Dump could be opened at 8:00 A.M. instead of 9:00 A.M.

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The Board discussed the problem and decided to give Mr. Franchino a key to Dump with which he could open the gate every morning before the Dumpmaster came on duty. The Board informed Mr. Franchino, however, that if the privilege was abused, the key would be taken away and the Collectors would only be permitted to dump when the Dumpmaster was on duty.

The Board then held a public hearing on the Special Assessment Roll for the improvement of Dickinson Ave. at Central Nyack. No one appeared before the Board in opposition to the adoption of the Roll.

After returning to regular business, Mr. Schmersahl moved the following resolution:

WHEREAS, an assessment roll has been caused to be prepared by this Town Board for and in connection with a certain improvement consisting of the paving of a portion of Dickinson Avenue at Central Nyack, in said Town, from Towt Street, also known as Waldron Avenue, to the boundary line between the Towns of Clarkstown and Orangetown, which said roll was completed and filed in the office of the Town Clerk of said Town on or about January 7th, 1955, and,

WHEREAS, due notice of the completion of said assessment roll and of the time and place when and where this Board would meet to hear and consider any objections that might be made to said roll and for the purpose of reviewing, correcting and amending the same, was duly given by the Town Clerk by the publication of due notice thereof in the Journal News, a newspaper published at Nyack, in the County of Rockland, and the Town Board duly met at the time and place specified, and a hearing was duly held upon said assessment roll; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED' that said assessment roll be and it hereby is approved, adopted and affirmed by the Town Board, as originally proposed and filed, and it is

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk be instructed to annex to said assessment roll a warrant which shall be signed by the Supervisor and countersigned by the Town Clerk, commanding the Receiver of Taxes and Assessments to collect from the several persons named in said assessment roll, the sum or sums opposite their respective names, and to pay the same to the Supervisor of the Town.

Mr. Morton Silberman, Attorney for Murray Stern of Congers, presented a petition to the Board for the establishment of a Sewer District for the Stern development. Mr. Schmersahl moved the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, a written petition dated February 10, 1955, in due form and containing the required signatures has been presented to and filed with the Town Board of the Town of Clarkstown, Rockland County, New York, for the establishment of a sewer district in the Hamlet of Congers, in the said Town of Clarkstown, bounded and described as follows:

BEGINNING at the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly right-of-way line of the West Shore Railroad Company and the northerly line of Gilcrest Road which point is the southwest corner of the within described premises; thence (1) running in a northerly direction along the said easterly right-of-way line of said Railroad

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north $28^{\circ} 40'$ east 1003 feet to a point; thence (2) turning and running in an easterly direction south $51^{\circ} 00'$ east 170 feet to the edge of Lake St. Rita, also known as Congers Lake; thence (3) continuing in an easterly direction along the shore line of said Lake a distance of 785 feet more or less to a point on the said shore line which point is 25 feet more or less east of the northeast corner of a dam on the said lake; thence (4) turning and running in a southerly direction south $28^{\circ} 40'$ west a distance of 215 feet more or less to a Rockland County Monument on the west side of Gilcrest Road; thence (5) along the westerly side of said Gilcrest Road south $64^{\circ} 00'$ west 210.34 feet to another Rockland County Monument; thence (6) still along the westerly side of Gilcrest Road the following courses: south $42^{\circ} 00'$ west 137.17 feet to a Rockland County Monument and south $29^{\circ} 00'$ west 250.61 feet to a Rockland County Monument; thence (7) on a curve to the right having a radius of 64.85 feet and a length of 85.19 feet to a point on the northerly side of Gilcrest Road; thence (8) in a westerly direction along the northerly side of Gilcrest Road north $75^{\circ} 44'$ west 147.47 feet to a Rockland County Monument; thence (9) continuing along the northerly side of Gilcrest Road north $75^{\circ} 00'$ west 319.50 feet to the point of beginning.

WHEREAS, the improvements consist of the erection, construction and maintenance of a sewerage system, to serve the said district, including main and lateral sewers, treatment beds, and all incidental equipment, including the acquisition lands and rights-of-way therefor, in accordance with certain plans made a part of such petition now on file in the office of the Town Clerk of the said Town, and

WHEREAS, the maximum amount proposed to be expended for the improvements as stated in said petition is none, and it is hereby

ORDERED, that a meeting of the Town Board of the said Town of Clarkstown shall be held at the office of the Town Clerk in New City, New York, on the 11th day of March, 1955, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon of that day, to consider the said petition and to hear all persons interested in the subject thereof, concerning the same, and for such other action on the part of said Town Board with relation to the said petition as may be required by law or proper in the premises.

Mr. Dillon presented a notice of public hearing on the petition of the New York Central for permission to remove the gate watchman at the Congers crossing. The notice had been sent by the Public Service Comm. and was similar to one which had been received earlier except that the place of hearing was given as New City instead of Nyack.

The Clerk was instructed to find out where the hearing was to be held.

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Mr. Dillon read a letter from the Dept. of Public Works in regard to the widening of Route 304. The letter merely stated that the District Office of the Dept. of Public Works would be contacted to determine if Route 304 was on the program for reconstruction in the near future.

The Clerk was instructed to invite the Assistant District Engineer of the Dept. of Public Works to the Feb. 24 meeting so that the matter could be discussed with him.

Mr. Roepe reported on the matter of a Brochure setting forth the residential and commercial advantages of the Town, which had been brought up at an earlier meeting. Mr. Roepe said that if the amount to be expended was less than \$2,000, a permissive referendum would be necessary.

The Board instructed the Clerk to write to Mr. Robert Lopez of the Department of Commerce to attend the Feb. 24 meeting so that the matter could be discussed further with him.

Mr. Roepe reported on the matter of the omission of certain properties in the West Nyack Water Supply District. Mr. Roepe said that the District had been formed in 1951 and it was only possible to go back one year to pick up taxes on omitted properties. He also said that the amount involved was hardly sufficient to warrant any action.

Mr. Dillon presented a list of names which had been recommended by the Valley Cottage Fire Co. and the Valley Cottage Civic Association for appointments as Commissioners and Treasurer of the District.

WHEREAS, citizens of the Jewish faith, residing in the Township of Clarkstown, New York, are now participating in the nationwide celebration of the American Jewish Tercentenary, which marks the 300th anniversary of Jewish settlement in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the theme of this observance, "Man's Opportunities and Responsibilities Under Freedom," will provide a unique occasion for Americans to strengthen their understanding of the principles of democratic freedom and the tradition of harmony among all citizens; and

WHEREAS, all citizens of the Township of Clarkstown, New York are proud of the part our Township has played through the years in championing religious liberty and the humanitarian doctrines which have marked our Nation as a symbol of freedom in the world today; and

WHEREAS, throughout the history of the Township of Clarkstown, New York, people of the Jewish faith have participated in every facet of our community's growth and development;

Mr. Burleigh brought up the subject of an ordinance to cover sewage disposal and drainage systems in development.

After considerable discussion the proposed ordinance was referred to the Town Attorney for legal opinion.

Mr. Burleigh informed the Board that one of the Parkway contractors, John Arborio, had been using a private road at Bardonia owned by George Parsells, and after repairing it once, he had refused to repair it a second time. Mr. Burleigh said that if Mr. Parsells was good enough to permit the contractor to use the road, it should be restored to its original state.

The Town Clerk was instructed to write to Mr. Arborio and request that the road be repaired.

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Bills Nos. 102 to 200 on Warrant #2 in the amount of \$ 19,685.40
were audited and ordered paid.

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was
adjourned.
